

Construction of fiber optic cables in Africa



Article Overview

Africa has been rapidly expanding its terrestrial fiber optic networks, with over 1.3 million kilometers deployed by 2024, connecting urban centers, landlocked countries, and regional hubs.

Overview of Fiber Optic Infrastructure

Terrestrial fiber optic cables in Africa are land-based networks that extend connectivity from submarine cable landing stations to inland cities, rural areas, and cross-border corridors, forming high-capacity backbones for telecommunications and internet services . Unlike submarine cables, which primarily link continents, terrestrial networks ensure intra-continental connectivity, reduce latency, and provide redundancy for national and regional data traffic . These networks are essential for digital economies, e-governance, mobile backhaul, and broadband expansion.

Key Projects and Regional Initiatives

- East and Southern Africa: Angola Telecom and Liquid Dataport activated a new fiber route from Luanda to Johannesburg, passing through the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Zambia, and Zimbabwe, enhancing regional backbone diversity . A 2,500 km direct link from Luanda to Lusaka via Chavuma was also operationalized in 2023 to strengthen COMESA connectivity .
- Central and Southern Africa: A 10,000 km regional fiber-optic backbone is under construction across the Democratic Republic of Congo, Zambia, Zimbabwe, Malawi,...
